
Time for Fall Antenna Maintenance

Winter storms with howling winds are no time to be on the roof or tower doing repairs or maintenance. While the weather is still reasonably decent, a walkthrough of all the antenna arrays, guys and cabling is a must to ensure a nice warm winter in the shack, and not hanging on for dear life in the ccccold.



The photo shows my 160m resonator that became intermittent after 2 years on the roof. After peeling back the outer insulation it was revealed that the connection was covered in a crispy crud of corrosion. Thankfully I was able to break it down, clean up the wires and termination screw and washers, and put things back to rights. A good application of waterproof grease on the screw and wires and a few layers of good old "Scotch-88" finished up the patch job for another couple of years.
